I. Allegro

"L'estro Armonico" was a set of 12 concertos that Vivaldi wrote and published in 1711. This particular movement comes from the 6th concerto and was originally written for solo violin and strings.

Amalgama

Roque Carbajo (b.1951)

Written in 2000 and dedicated to French musician, Cristobal Soto, Amalgama is a syncopated piece shifting keys frequently. Aside from composing and performing, Roque Carbajo also teaches at the Preparatory School of music of the UQAM and at College Marie de France and College Durocher Saint-Lambert in Quebec.

Hay Amores

Performed by Columbian singer, Shakira, Hay Amores is essentially a Bolero love song. This song is about the kind of love that grows fonder as time passes by. This song was written for the 2007 film, Love in the Time of Cholera.

Libertango

Astor Piazzolla (1921–1992)

Arr. Öztürk

Piazzolla is one of Argentina's most well-known composers and is credited with developing the Tango Nuevo (new tango) where he blended traditional tango elements with both classical music as well as jazz. Libertango is perhaps Piazzolla's most famous piece and can be commonly heard in fancy concert halls all the way to a dingy jazz club. In addition to the melody and parts of this piece, you will also hear a section with improvised solos, a common element heard in Piazzolla's music.

Apache

Jerry Lordan (1934 – 1995)

Although Apache was first recorded by Bert Weedon, this tune was made popular by the Shadows, whose version was recorded and topped the charts in the mid 1960's. This instrumental song had a similar sound as the popular surf sound of the 1960's popularized by guitarists like Dick Dale with the use of heavy amounts of reverb and tremolo.

'Cause We've Ended As Lovers

Stevie Wonder (b. 1950)

Written and released in 1974 by Stevie Wonder, "Cause We've Ended As Lovers was written for Stevie's wife, Syreeta who was married to Stevie from 1970-1972. This song describes that while they are no longer lovers, they remain friends. The version we are performing is from guitar hero, Jeff Beck, who made this tune one of his most well-known instrumentals.

Changes Rasih Öztürk

Rasih wrote this piece when he was 16 as part of an album paying homage to several of his guitar heroes. This particular piece is written in the style of rock/jazz fusion guitar technician, Al Di Meola. This piece incorporates intricate guitar lines as well as solos from the guitar, keyboard, and complex polyrhythms within the drum set part.
