William Grant Still, often called the “Dean of African-American Classical Composers,” was a pioneering figure in American music. He was the first African American to conduct a major U.S. symphony orchestra and composed over 200 works, including the landmark *Afro-American Symphony* (1930). His music often blends classical forms with African-American and Latin American folk traditions.

*Danzas de Panamá* is a vibrant suite originally for string quartet based on Panamanian folk tunes collected by ethnomusicologist Elisabeth Waldo in the 1940s. Composed in 1948, the work consists of four movements, each evoking distinct dance styles and cultural influences.

## Impromptu for cello choir, Op.29

Julius Klengel (1859-1933)

Julius Klengel was a German cellist and composer, celebrated for his contributions to cello repertoire and pedagogy. A member of the Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra from age 15, he later became its principal cellist and taught at the Leipzig Conservatory. Klengel composed hundreds of works for cello, including concertos, chamber music, and technical studies that remain staples for cellists today.

The *Impromptu, Op. 29* is a lyrical and virtuosic piece for cello ensemble. Written in the Romantic style, it features soaring melodies that were the “pop” music of Klengel’s day. The work alternates between introspective passages and brilliant flourishes, allowing performers to showcase both technical skill and warm, singing tone.
